## CHALLENGE, NURTURE

At St Killian's College we are aware of the importance of a smooth transition to post-primary education. The pupils are supported throughout their journey into Year 8 in a number of ways;

- MidYis testing in June of Primary 7 to ensure appropriate class placement, consolidated by CCEA adaptive testing in English and Maths early in Term 1.
- Visits to all partner primary schools by Head of KS3 and the Learning Support Co-ordinator to review academic progress of each pupil and highlight any pastoral needs.
- Allocation of pupils to specific form classes with a dedicated Form Teacher, Head of Year and Head of KS3.
- Participation of all Year 8 pupils in the Accelerated Reader Programme.
- Fun day in August to meet your classmates.
- Orientation day with Form Teachers including a tour of the school led by KS5 Prefects.

## STEM Success

Each year our students become involved in a wide range of STEM projects and initiatives which encourage them to develop an interest in these crucial areas as well as gaining valuable links with our local employers.

Last year a group of Year 10 students competed in the annual First Lego League competition held at W5. The competition enhances the students'

computational thinking skills in programming the robots and generating ideas to solve the project problem. More than this, however, they provide opportunities for the students to work together, develop presentation skills and hone interview techniques. The preparation and build up for these competitions begin early in the academic year with teachers providing opportunities to work on projects at lunch time and after school. Although we didn't come away from the competitions with individual prizes this year, they had a very successful day, coming in 6th place on the robotics challenge. The pupils really enjoyed being able to liaise with our partners at Caterpillar who were a massive help as always. Some are already looking forward to coming back next year to improve our finishing position again.



In 2023/24 we continued our involvement in Sentinus' flagship initiative, the R&D Project. In recent years we have built up good working relationships with NIE Networks as our link company. Aside from the opportunity to work towards a solution for a real-world problem, our students avail of the experience and expertise of link engineers. They are able to provide invaluable insight into the variety of career paths available to our young people at a stage when they are making

important decisions for themselves. This year our group focused on the project title- 'Understanding Frequency and The Need for Network Monitoring'. With our network facing frequency losses during peak load times (5-9PM) due to an increased usage in power at this time. Our team was charged with finding a solution as we begin to transition to net zero. This kind of experience provided to our students will undoubtedly stand them in good stead for future endeavours into STEM careers.



### Sports and Extra-curricular Activities

### Sporting Achievements

**Hurling** – The College continues to compete at the highest level in Ulster, where our teams par-ticipate at A grade hurling level. Our Hurlers had a hugely successful year, one that I will never forget. Our Senior Hurlers began by winning the Mageean Cup in January which was a first for St Killian's, and bringing it back to Garron Tower for the first time in 60 years. The team then went on to become All Ireland Champions, defeating Portum-na from Galway in the semifinal and Blackwater College from Waterford in the final to win the Paddy Buggy Cup for the first time in our history. Congratulations and thank you all the mentors involved, to our local clubs, to our parents but in particular to a special group of players who truly deserve all their success.

Not surprisingly this success was also reflected in individual successes for Conor McCann as a QUB Future Star and to our at the six Ulster Schools Hurling All Stars - Joseph McLaughlin, Cormac McKeown, Orin O'Connor, Thomas McLaughlin, Colla Ward and Callagh Mooney.

In Junior Hurling the Year 10 Hurlers won the Antrim Shield which was played over several blitz days. The Year 8 hurlers were runners up to in the Antrim Schools Cup, both of these games were streamed live over Facebook and were under lights at Dunsilly which is a great experience for the boys and mentors. Our Leonard Cup Hurlers deserve special men-tion as they were beaten by a last-minute goal in the Ulster Final by St Mary's Belfast in what was an excellent final at the DUB QUB.

**Camogie** – Camogie – Our camogie teams have competed at the highest level in all Ulster competitions since 2022, setting high standards against all the schools that they come up against. The Senior Camogie team have been hugely successful in Ulster where they were in the Corn Uan Uladh Senior A final in 2023 and 2024 where they were beaten by a particularly good St Patrick's Maghera team on both occasions. The Junior Camogie team also followed suit and featured in the 2023 and 2024 Corn Eimhear A finals, but unfortunately losing out to Maghera again.

Not surprisingly there were a number of significant individual awards for our players. Kady McNeill, Laura Black, Amy McAlister and Eva McNeill achieved Ulster College All Stars in 2024. While Maeve McAlister and Amy McAlister achieved QUB Future Stars in 2023.

We have had great representation at county level this



year with Laura Black, Rhianna Black, Kady McNeill and Leona Gillan all representing Antrim at U18 level. Whilst Maeve McAlister, Amy McAlister, Eva McNeill, Tamara Black, Erin McNaughton, Niamh McCollam, Laoise McCollam, Mia McKeegan, Kiera McLaughlin, Eimear Ward, Cliodhna Thompson and Laoiseach McNaughton all playing for Antrim's U16 and U15 teams.

**Gaelic Football and Ladies Gaelic Football** – The tradition of Gaelic football continues to grow strongly in the College. In Gaelic Football our Year 9 boys were JJ Reilly Shield Finalists while the Year 8 and 10 boys participated in the Antrim Schools Shields.

In Ladies Gaelic Football our U14 girls reached the Ulster semi-final and were beaten by a strong Fermanagh team and Meabh O'Kane, who was selected to play for Antrim, won the Ulster and All-Ireland U14 Championship.

**Netball** – Netball within the college is experiencing a revival. The Year 11 and 12 teams recently participated in the NEBSSA tournament at Ulster University, where their performances showcased their potential and dedication. Our Year 8, 9, and 10 teams will compete in the same tournament for their respective age groups in the new year, and we look forward to seeing their growth and achievements.



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**Soccer** – The soccer teams have had an outstanding start this year. In football our Yr 11 boys were the Mid Antrim Schools League and Cup Winners for 2024 Our Year 10 team remained undefeated at the MASSFA 7-a-side blitz and were the NEBSSA 5-a-side Winners for 2024. The Year 12 team secured the runner-up position in the Mid Antrim Secondary School League. Both the Year 10 and Year 12 teams are making excellent progress in the NI Plate and are hopeful of reaching the final.

Alec Watson in Yr12 was selected to represent NI in U16 football and Grace McAlister in Yr11 was selected to NI Women's U15 squad. Outstanding achievements from two players who are totally committed to their sport.

Our football coaches in the college deserve special mention as they were awarded the Irish FA School Quality Mark - Bronze Accreditation for excellent levels of football provision for our boys and girls.

**Rugby** – Ulster Rugby continue to support the development of the sport within the college by delivering sessions in PE class, lunchtime and after school. The target in 2022/23 was to increase participation of girls playing rugby which has begun to bear fruit.

#### **Other Sports:**

We have a number of other pupils who participate in a range of sports from sailing, Taekwondo, Judo and Boxing. Congratulations to Alistair and Sophie Aistion both of whom won gold and silver in their respective age groupings in Taekwondo. While Aedan McRandle, Brian Magill all have been successful in a range of boxing competitions. In Judo, Michael Dinning in Yr10 is the NI Schools Champion. Eamonn Ward is the 2023 U21 Commonwealth Judo Champion, not to be outdone his brother Colla is the 2024 U18 All Ireland Champion and the youngest brother Dara is the Ulster U15 Champion. Melissa Galway in Year 11 became the Cumann Rince Gaelach U15 World Champion 2024.

In addition to actually playing the sports the College now has a proud tradition in developing both coaches and officials for games. This year the GAA foundation Coaching and Young Whistlers award saw a large number of Year 13 and 14 students completing their foundation Coaching Awards and Young Whistlers Award. While both Mollie McKeown and Melissa Galway were trained and awarded Ulster Hockey Young umpires.

The Gaisce experience is a challenge that involves the participation in four activities – you choose your own activities for each challenge area: Develop a Skill. Help your Community. Get Active. Go on an Adventure! Gaisce provides a structured approach to measuring and recognising a young person's personal development. It's not about the additional work but more the additional value Gaisce adds to your life. Gaisce is not a competition, just an opportunity for young people to push themselves to achieve their goals.



To achieve the Gaisce Award, the pupils take part in activities for at least one hour a week in each of the three challenge areas:

- Personal Skill
- Community Involvement
- Physical Recreation

Our focus for this group of President's Award pupils is to achieve a presence through community involvement projects in the school and the Glens. The pupils have recently participated in Faith Friends. This was a project that involved working closely with the local primary school in Carnlough to develop their faith and prepare the younger pupils for their sacrament of confirmation. The pupils gave up one hour per week on a volunteering basis. Other Volunteering activities that they will now complete are as follows:

- Gaelic Games Cul Camps
- Fundraising for in house projects

They will soon undertake a 4-day hill walking expedition in the Lake District. The aim of this expedition is to develop initiative and a spirit of adventure by planning, training for and completing an adventurous journey as part of a team. The expeditions across all levels will involve one practice expedition and a qualifying expedition. Pupils will be hiking, camping and using small stoves to cook from for the duration of the expedition.

A recent survey concluded that having a President's Award was the third most popular aspect which universities look for on an application form behind qualifications and work experience. There are many advantages of undertaking the President's Award and it is a worthwhile programme but it has proven to be physically, mentally and emotionally challenging for students.

# Planning for the Future

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) forms an integral part of all students' programmes of study from Year 8-14. Students are enabled to become effective decision makers and are empowered to manage their own career development successfully giving due respect to their own needs, those of others and the wider community.

The 'CEIAG Learning Offer' underpins the careers provision across the whole school curriculum, taking account of careers education, careers information, the development of employability skills, work related learning and advice and guidance.

In Year 10, students begin to explore their personal strengths, skills and qualities. In order to assist research of potential career paths, students are introduced to the Skills Sector Council, STEM and school based 'work related learning' opportunities. Each student will also receive an individual interview with a member of the Careers Department to ensure appropriate subject choice at GCSE.

In Year 12, students have the opportunity to research more fully the range of career possibilities within the Skills Sector that may interest them. They will explore all options available to them and will be assisted in making an informed career path choice at Post 16. To support this, all students will have access to a personal interview with a specialist careers advisor from the Careers Service NI and to externally facilitated employment programmes arranged by the Careers Department and other subject departments. Careers Fairs and Conventions promoted by local Business Enterprise Partnerships etc are used to further enhance our student experience.





In Year 13 the students' main focus is on the research of potential post 18 options, primarily Further, Higher and Degree apprenticeship options. This usually incorporates visits from representatives accross a variety of institutions and trips to industry or conventions. They will also have the opportunity to experience the world of work through our work placement programmes as well as other work related activities. Students are encouraged to maintain a personal portfolio as they prepare for Post 18 career paths.

In Year 14 guidance and support is provided on the completion of application forms for UCAS, CAO, Universities in Europe, Further Education, US Scholarships, Apprenticeships etc... All students will be able to attend the local universities and Colleges Open Days as well as listen to talks from visiting speakers. The students are prepared for interviews and experience a mock interview.

### Student Destinations

Last year 92% of our Year 14 students secured their preferred College courses across the UK and Ireland.

St Killian's College has had students awarded All Ireland and The O'Fiaich Scholarships. Students are now applying successfully to higher apprenticeships in companies such as PWC and Kainos. ## A Message From Our Head Girl

# Learning Support

### A Sense of Belonging



Provision for additional educational needs in St Killian's College forms an integral part of the whole school's overall policy in curricular and pastoral provision. The policy is informed by the caring Catholic ethos of the College; its practical procedures are shaped by the Code of Practice on the identification and Assessment of Special Needs established by the Education (Northern Ireland) Order 1996, the Special Educational Needs Disability Order 2005 and the SEND Act 2016.

St Killian's College is committed to the provision of a broad and balanced curriculum, which offers equal access for all our students. As a College, we recognise that some students may have additional educational needs and we will make every possible arrangement to provide for their individual needs.

#### AIMS:

- To provide a broad, balanced, relevant, and differentiated curriculum as a right for all students in our College.
- To ensure that all children with additional needs feel valued, have a positive self-image, and are encouraged to participate in all activities.
- To promote the inclusion of all students with additional needs.
- To create a caring and supportive environment in which students can contribute to the planned provision for their individual learning needs and are given some personal responsibility for their own progress.
- To identify children with additional educational needs as early as possible in consultation with all teachers and relevant personnel.
- To offer guidance and reassurance to parents of those children with additional educational needs, considering the wishes, feelings and knowledge of parents at all stages.
- To ensure that all teachers in the College have an opportunity to develop and utilise all resources in support of students with additional educational needs

Students who have additional educational needs will be fully integrated in the everyday life of the College. The Learning Support Coordinator and Assistant Learning Support Coordinator working closely with the Senior Leadership and Pastoral Care Teams, will seek to identify those students who may experience barriers to their learning. Where identified, there will be a holistic approach to addressing these needs on an individual basis, in line with the Code of Practice.

St Killian's strives to provide effective working relationships with parents, external agencies and staff to ensure that the child is placed at the centre of the educational process in a caring and supportive environment.

### **Autism Impact Award**

We are delighted and proud to announce that St.Killian's College has been recognised as an Autism accessible environment through our achievement of the Autism Impact Award. # What help can be offered to pupils with Special Educational Needs and Disability?

# How are pupils included in the planning for their support and provision?

At St Killian's College, excellent relationships are fostered between students and members of staff to ensure all pupils feel comfortable and confident when having conversations about their education.

### When a pupil requires additional provision, this will be explained to that pupil as appropriate.

Pupils have the opportunity to voice any concerns or troubles they may be experiencing with their form tutors or any member of staff.

When reviewing provision, pupils will meet as appropriate with the LSCo, Head of Year or form teacher to resolve any worries they may have and promote understanding.

Well-established links and close co-operation with feeder schools ensures that appropriate provision is in place when pupils start St Killian's College. Parents and guardians are encouraged to provide relevant information about their child's special educational needs.

If a student is not making the expected progress, a record of concern will be raised by the student's form teacher before appropriate intervention and sourcing of additional support is put in place.

## How will the school prepare and support my child to join the school?

We have an outstanding Induction Programme in place for welcoming new pupils to the school. The LSCo and/or Head of KS3 will communicate with the primary SENCO and Primary 7 teacher to ensure all information is passed on and SEN information is transferred. Additional induction is provided to all as part of the normal induction process. Additional transition visits can be arranged for Primary 7 pupils by contacting the College.

## Drama and Music

The Drama and Music departments are a hub for creative expression and imagination. Pupils are empowered to share and develope their talents within an atmosphere of security, trust and respect.

At St Killian's there is a thriving Drama department where students from Year 8–14 flourish. The department's Drama Club is led by the Year 13 and 14 students at lunchtime. In addition there are regular trips to The Lyric, The Opera House and The Mac as well as visits to the Riverside Theatre, Coleraine. As a department, the outcomes for our students are of a very high standard with pupils progressing as far as Hollywood, where past pupil Seamus O'Hara has been recognised with a prestigious Oscar.

Similarly the Music Department offers a wide range of activities for students with differing tastes. There is a Irish Traditional group, a rock band and a beautify choir which recently performed for a TV audience on RTE. Furthermore, students can pursue other instruments which are offered through individual or group tuition by the peripatetic service, including guitar, piano and voice. Students are entered for Associated Board and Trinity College examinations in order to achieve their grades in the various instruments on offer.



## Take 5 Champions

We are very proud to be a Take 5 school. This year we have promoted Take 5 with our Key Stage 3 pupils who have voted to appoint Take 5 Champions. The role of the Champions is to actively promote positive relationships among students and staff around our school and to aid everyone's emotional wellbeing.



The pupils have been promoting health and wellbeing in the College and have made concerted efforts to ensure that we look after ourselves and each other. The Take 5 Champions have participated in a range of activities including mindful art competitions, leading assemblies and participation in shared education trips to Stormont and the Breaid Arts Centre. Our work has been recognised by the EA and have been awarded with a Level 2 award.



## Student Council

The College has an active Student Council which is made up of representatives of all year groups. Each member took part in Student Council elections in September where they had to speak in front of their year group to convince them that they were the best person to represent their year group. The opinions of our students are frequently sought across a range of areas including Learning and Teaching, extra-curricular activities, lunchtime activities and student welfare (e.g.) Anti-Bullying Policy and Mobile Phone Policy. The council meets regularly and has been instrumental in creating the school badge, uniform and College Prayer which was created by the student body.

# Applications and Admissions

### Admissions Criteria For Entry Into Year 8

### Respective functions of the Board of Governors and Principal in relation to Admissions to the school.

The Board of Governors of St Killian's College, has delegated to an Admissions Sub-Committee, which will comprise three Governors and the Principal, the authority to determine the admissions to the school. Preference will be given to students who are resident in Northern Ireland at the time of their proposed admission to the college over students not so resident.

If the number of applications is greater than the admissions number, the following Admissions Criteria will be applied in the order of priority set down below:

- 1. Applicants who have a sibling enrolled, at the date of application in St Killian's College.
- 2. Applicants who are the eldest child in a family eligible to transfer to mainstream post primary education. This criterion covers "only children" and will treat twins or other multiples as joint eldest.
- **3.** Applicants who are children of the current permanent (including part-time) teaching, administrative, technical or ancillary staff of the school, or of staff due to take up such appointment by the 1 October.
- 4. Applicants who, at the date of application, normally reside in any of the following parishes; Ballymena, Braid, Carnlough, Cushendall, Cushendun, Glenariffe, Glenarm, Glenravel, Larne.
- 5. Applicants who attend any Maintained, Controlled or Integrated Primary School located within the boundaries of the parishes listed in criterion 4.
- 6. In the event of oversubscription students will be admitted by a criterion that prioritises applicants where the letters of their name (as entered on a Birth Certificate) places them on a rank established by any order of all of the letters within the alphabet. Children will be selected for admission on the basis of initial letter of surname (as entered on Birth Certificate) in the order determined by a randomised selection of letters carried out prior to the college receiving the online Transfer Forms.

In the event of surnames beginning with the same initial letter, the subsequent letters of the surname will be used in alphabetic order. In the event of two identical surnames, the alphabetical order of the initials of the forenames will be used.

### Transfer Between Schools

The College will welcome applications from students in years 9-13 who reside in the parishes listed above and who may wish to take advantage of the education that St Killian's will offer.

### Admissions To Year 8 After 1 September 2025

Parents who wish to have their child considered for admission in the event of a place arising after 1 September 2025 should write to the Principal clearly stating this. In the event of a vacancy arising the above criteria will be applied to these applications only.





### Duty to Verify

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on any online Application Form/Transfer Form. The provision of false or incorrect information or the failure to provide information within deadlines set by the College may result in the withdrawal of a place or the inability of the College to offer a place.


## Transport Arrangements

## Charges and Remissions Policy

The Board of Governors of each grant-aided school is required by the Education Reform (NI) Order 1989 to establish a charging policy for activities funded from resources under its control.

### The policy of the College is to charge:

- The costs of board and lodging for all students on residential field trips (when such field trips take place mainly within school hours parents in receipt of Income Support will have these charges remitted if they so request);
- 2. The cost of residential and non-residential field trips wholly or mainly outside school hours when the student's participation has been agreed in advance by the parent; the charge will include the cost of travel, entrance fees, equipment and materials and, where appropriate, board and lodging;
- The cost of breakage and / or fines deemed necessary as a result of a student's misbehaviour;
- 4. The cost of entering a student to sit or re-sit an examination where no preparation has been provided by the school or where a student is re-sitting a modular element for a second time;
- 5. The cost of any re-marking of public exams when requested by the parent;
- 6. The cost of individual tuition in the playing of a musical instrument;
- 7. The cost of optional extra activities, including transport, which are not an integral part of the school curriculum and where participation is on the basis of parental choice and a willingness to meet such charges as are to be made.
